## Insight

Over time, the formula was modified to include ingredients such as coconut oil, palm kernel oil, and lanolin, which helped to moisturize the skin and reduce irritation. In the 1950s, shaving cream in a pressurized

can was introduced, making it even more convenient. This shaving cream used a mixture of air and a propellant, such as butane or propane, to create a foam. The foam was easier to apply to the skin and provided a closer shave than traditional shaving cream.
